The Bugle Recipe ...

Apple Charlotte Taken from Woman's Weekly Magazine when it was printed in black and white. This time it's not a Yorkshire recipe, so thank you to Anne Pledger for this contribution...

Ingredients	Method
700g Cooking apples	Mix breadcrumbs, orange rind, sugar and suet in a large bowl.
125-150g Fresh breadcrumbs	Peel, core and slice the apples finely.
150g Demerara sugar	Grease a large ovenproof soufflé type dish. Place alternate layers of crumb mix and apples,
50g Shredded suet	[finish with crumb mix on top] press each layer down really well as the pudding shrinks during
50g butter	cooking. Dot the top of the pudding with the butter. Cover with foil and put a small hole in the
Grated rind of an orange	middle of the foil. Bake 175 for about 40-45 min. (test apple is cooked).
_	Remove foil and cook for about 15mins to crisp the top. Can be eaten hot or cold with custard
	or cream.

Things you might not know ...

In the December 2019 Newsletter we asked you if knew where this is? Only 5 miles from Haltham is Revesby, yet did you know that hidden in the wood looking past the deer park is Revesby Abbey dating from 1843?



The Revesby Estate dates back to 1143 when the estate was left to the Cistercian monks of Rievaulx Abbey, to build a monastic community in Lincolnshire. After the Dissolution of the Monasteries, the Abbey was demolished and a country house built in the Jacobean style. Revesby Abbey as it stands today, was built in 1843 - 1845 by JB Stanhope. The house is no longer part of the Revesby Estate but is in private ownership, and currently undergoing restoration. Visit http://www.revesbyabbey.co.uk/history.html

Revesby Estate is also associated with Sir Joseph Banks (1743-1820), the naturalist, a botanist who accompanied Captain Cook on his circumnavigation of the globe. Banks was more than just a passenger, though; he helped finance Cook's expedition out of his own pocket. He brought back countless new plant species, many of which he brought to Revesby, where he also planted large numbers of the trees we see today in the Estate grounds. History on our doorstep!
